#### The William Blackfox Awards

Master William Blackfox was the author and illustrator of the cartoon Warthaven. He gave generously of his time and talents, and was very supportive of the Kingdom Chroniclers until his untimely death.

To honor his memory, the Office of the Society Chronicler sponsors the annual Master William Blackfox Awards to recognize excellence in the work of Chroniclers and newsletter contributors. Newsletters provide a valuable resource and communication tool for SCA members around the world!

In 2007 the award was extended to recognize SCA Websites.

How are people nominated for the William Blackfox Awards?

The Kingdom Chroniclers make the initial nominations from the works in their Kingdom. (Obviously, their own work is not eligible; neither are Corporate Publications.) All kingdoms are encouraged to participate and send in at least two nominations for each of the seven categories. (Note to all Chroniclers - be sure to send copies of your publications to your Kingdom Chronicler. Not only is it policy for you to do so, but it is the only way you can be nominated to participate in this competition.)

Most kingdoms notify nominees of their nomination, either by mentioning their names in print or by sending them a letter congratulating them on their fine work and their nomination to the competition. It is important that all participants realize that the nomination of their work is an indication of excellence. The entries are then separated into the eight categories and the judging is completed by the Society Chronicler, with the assistance of disinterested individuals or experts, where necessary.

In each category, a winner and a Commended entry are chosen. The winners of the William Blackfox Awards, along with those entries recognized as Commended, will be announced each fall, and will appear in the Kingdom newsletters and Tournaments Illuminated. The complete list of all nominees will also appear on this web site. If you have any questions or suggestions, please send them to me at chronicler@sca.org.

What efforts are recognized?

Best Overall Newsletter - this does not necessarily mean the best-looking newsletter, but rather the newsletter which best meets the needs of the local group or guild for which it is published. It should accurately reflect the status of the group and be a valuable tool for growth and promotion of the SCA goals and ideals. This title is awarded to the newsletter and the Chronicler.

Best Layout and Design - for the best looking newsletter in balance and style. Awarded to the newsletter and the Chronicler.

Best Artwork - for artwork on cover or interior of the newsletter. Awarded to the newsletter and the artist.

Best Special Edition - for Arts & Sciences issues, or other limited-focus issues of a geographic group (Canton, Shire, Barony, etc.). Awarded to the newsletter and the Chronicler.

Best Special Interest Newsletter - this category recognizes guild newsletters, research newsletters, and Arts & Science focus newsletters (such as lace-making). Awarded to the newsletter and the Chronicler.

Best Regular Feature - for those cartoons, articles, columns, etc. which appear regularly in the particular newsletter. Awarded to the creator or feature writer and the newsletter.

Best Article - recognizes excellence in articles appearing in a local newsletter. Awarded to the writer and the newsletter.

Best Poetry or Short Fiction - recognizes the author of an outstanding poem or piece of short fiction. Awarded to the writer and the newsletter.

As March approaches and April with Easter is not far off, let us consider the subject of "funny bunnies." No, not Easter bunnies, or Cadbury white bunnies bearing chocolate dipped delicious cream or caramel eggs, but rabbits and hares who share ears and others who carry messages. Confused? Lost? Read on for clarification. To start, let us first consider the true hare; they are members of Leporidae or the rabbit family. All Leporidae, including the rabbits and hares, are herbivores. Unlike rabbits, true hares (genus Lepus) are larger and have ears that are longer than their bodies. The common brown or European Hare Lepus europaeus was found throughout Europe, including the British Isles, Finland, Sweden, and Germany, and was a foodstuff as far back as 20,000 years ago. In England, the hares then were native animals unlike the rabbits, which were introduced into Britain perhaps with the Roman legions. If so, those early rabbits died out and had to be then reintroduced by the Normans in the late 11th or early 12th centuries. Rabbits were easily domesticated, and communities of rabbits were often raised in warrens for food and fur throughout the medieval period. The native brown hare, meanwhile, was never domesticated in England so it escaped being shoved into warrens and raised for meat. Instead hares remained a sought after game animal. Hares (and rabbits that had gone feral) were hunted, and even considered poor man's game as they could be hunted on foot or coursed with dogs or even probably poached or trapped to provide fresh meat for the impoverished dwellers of the countryside. As to the term "Bunnies," the OED records that a bony or bunny was originally a lump or swelling, but by 1699 it was also being used as a pet name for a rabbit or as an endearing word for a child. "Sweet Peg... my honey, my bunny, my duck, my dear," dates from 1606, according to W.C. Hazlitt. The Easter hare or Easter bunny,

meanwhile, is related to the German Osterhase but seems to date to only the mid 19th century in England.

#### THREE RUNNING HARES or RABBITS

We'll start with the motif (a theme or element which recurs) of the three running hares or rabbits, which are displayed in such a way that they share a total of only three ears. Take a close look at the illustration [http://www.chrischapmanphotography.co.uk/hares/] Three rabbits, three eyes, and only three ears, yet each rabbit seems to have a pair of ears. A triangle is formed in the middle of the design. Are they hares or are they rabbits? Which Leporidae might they be? Depending upon the length of the ears and length of the body, some are deemed hares; others are deemed to be rabbits. Both animals were popular subjects in various arts, and it can be hard to tell one from the other in the illustrations and surviving artworks being presented in the sources. Randle Holme described the problem of rabbit versus hare in his 1688 The Academy of Armory when he wrote, "The shape of the Rabbet and Hare are so like in their draught, that an Herald may mistake one for another in his Blazon." [As these sources vary and materials are indexed under both terms, I will use the terms "hare" and "rabbit" interchangeably in the following article.] In any case, the motif of the three running hares is a clever design and certainly international in its scope.

It turns out the earliest to date examples of the three running rabbits appear in northwestern China. In and around Dunhuang, Gansu Province, may be found many surviving examples of the motif. Starting in the late 4th century, the nearby cliffs at Mogao were dug out and fashioned into cave temples by Buddhist monks. These temples or sanctuaries were decorated with murals, decorative art, and statues. Between the late 6th century and the early 10th century (Sui (581-618 CE) and Tang (618-906 CE) dynasties) the image of the running hares was painted on at least seventeen

cave/temple ceilings. (see Classical Chinese Puzzles) The study of the running rabbits motif has been part of the lifelong work of the scholar Guan Youhui of the Dunhuang Academy. Dunhuang is located on the ancient Eastern Silk Road, and Guan Youhui believes the running rabbits motif, along with other decorative designs, came to this region from west and central China, despite the fact that to date no early examples have been found. Henrik Sørensen mentions clear Central Asian influences in the paintings. The motif of the running hares has a lasting appeal and appears today in a decorative mosaic on the floor of the Dunhuang Museum and on a variety of scarves, t-shirts, paintings, and jewelry which are created to be sold to visitors.

The question now becomes: Did the motif of the running rabbits travel the famous Silk Road to the West or did it arise in the West without help from the East? The 2004 exhibit volume The Silk Road and also the team of Andrew, Greeves, and Chapman suggests the rabbit or hare motif arose with Sasanian Persia in the form of silk designs. Did it first travel the Silk Road as a design on textiles? Others suggest India as the source. Moving from China westward, the rabbits appear on Iranian metalwork, circa 1200, an Iranian brass plate, and on a copper Ilkhanid coin minted in 1280-1281. It can also be found in examples of glass and on pottery. A motif of rabbit wheels (lampas) survives on Iranian cloth of gold fragments dating from the mid 13th century (1225-1250-1260 CE). Item 1993.140 is now housed at the Cleveland Museum of Art. It is described in ARTstor and on the museum's website as "Repeated roundels enclose four rabbits that share two pairs of ears and run in a circle. This motif, known as an animal wheel, is very ancient in Asia." Another Asian example, featuring four hares, can be found in the ruins of the White Temple of Guge in Tibet. Two roundels, dated mid tenth century to 1630 AD, can be found on a wall panel. A late 12th -13th century temple at Alchi in present day India, but formerly under the influence of Tibet, also features the motif in roundels.

Searching through the art database ARTstor, one can identify several manuscripts, which contain the motif or rather a variation of the motif where four running rabbits with four ears form a square. The Bodleian Library at Oxford contains an end of the 12th century French Psalter. MS. Auct. D. 2. 8 is described as "a green circle, on which four hares run nose to tail; their ears, four only in a familiar visual trick, join in the centre to frame a square ('rosette of hares')." The Bodleian also owns a French Gospel of St. Matthew dated to 1200. MS. Laud Lat. 41 is described as containing: "Decorated initial 'L(IBER)' has rosette of four running hares with shared ears." A second quarter of the 13th century

bestiary, the English MS. Bodl. 764 depicts a "Panel with 'rosette of hares' with foliated scrolls." Lastly, there is another Bodleian example which is an early 13th century English school manuscript (MS. Douce 218) depicting "Decorated initial 'Q(VIDAM)' enclosing running hares." The British Library's MS. Add. 21926 (Grandison Psalter, 1270-1280) depicts three running rabbits, as does a letter "P" from a 13th century Lambeth Palace manuscript.

In China the motif decorated the ceilings and a wall panel in Tibet of Buddhist shrines. In the west, the motif appears in cathedrals and churches. Seventeen churches in contemporary Devon feature the three hares motif on nearly thirty ceiling bosses. Several are associated or named as being Tinners' Rabbits, although no one can exactly explain how the ancient motif was adopted by the Tin miners or the stannary towns in the Dartmoor of southwest England. (Does it have something to do with rabbits and hares going to ground in burrows?) According to English journalist Nic Fleming, other examples of the motif may be found "in a chapel in Cotehele, Cornwall, in medieval stained glass in the Holy Trinity church in Long Melford, Suffolk, in a plaster ceiling in Scarborough, North Yorks, and on floor tiles from Chester Cathedral and in the parish church in Long Crendon, Bucks." There's a carved roof boss in a Spreyton Church dating from 1451. The British Society for the History of Mathematics lists these sites as connected with the motif: "Broadclyst; Chagford; Chester; Long Crendon; Long Melford; North Bovey; Sampford Courteney; Scarborough; Spreyton; Throwleigh; Widecombe."

In Germany the motif appears in the stonework as part of a 12th century window on the Cathedral of Paderborn in Germany and on the façade of St. Jean Cathedral, Lyons, France. Ceramic tiles with the motif can be found at Wissembourg in France dating from the 13th century and at Konstanz in Germany dating from the 14th century. Boris Khaimovich mentions that the motif may also be found on house facades, town halls, and as emblems of professional guilds. It was a popular motif on pottery created by the Habanes in the Carpathian region in the 18th century. Oddly enough, the motif also turns up in synagogues and on gravestones in Jewish cemeteries. Boris Khaimovich writes, "In the late eighteenth to early nineteenth century this motif appears in various Ashkenazi ritual objects and on the tombstones of Eastern European Jews in the same region... [and as parts of] "synagogue murals."

Scholars debate the meaning of the motif and ponder the more than 5000 miles and hundreds of years that separate the images in China and those in England. What was its significance and why was it adopted in so many places? For those wondering, yes, the rabbits or hares run in both clockwise and counter clockwise fashion.

In the Far East it's associated with Buddhism and the tripartite. If it appears on a church in the west, it said to depict the Trinity (The Trinity Sunday prayer begins, "Father: The true God, One in Three and Three in One.") Dr. Susan Andrew who did her dissertation on medieval English roof bosses believes that such decorative elements "played an important role in medieval social and religious life -- for example, as aide memoires and devices used during prayer to help cure the soul from sin." Others prefer to look to the magical connections of fertility and spring. There's also a long association of rabbits and hares with the moon and magic. It is less clear what the meaning was to the various Islamic artists. Chad Dailey discusses these aspects in his talk about an example held by the Louvre. Dating from 1200 CE, it features just one rabbit and while he sees this dish as part of the same tradition, Dailey points out the Islamic point of view favors a unity of God. Perhaps the surviving Iranian pieces with the motif just reflect the popularity of the motif and not a religious message. In synagogues, the "rotating rabbits" are said to be linked to the text of an ancient German saying of "Three hares sharing three ears, Yet every one of them has two." Another saying is attached to the image of the mid-19th century Dinant cookie board. It reads ""Voor Drie Hazen, Drie Ooren En Toch Is leder Met Twee Geboren," which means in English: "While Three Hares, Three Ears And Still Is Each Born With Two Ears."

Lastly, one aspect adding to the appeal is the magic of the puzzle. Retired mathematician David Singmaster has presented his findings on the three-hares motif from around the world. He believes it arose naturally from certain purely formal, mathematical-puzzle considerations. Singmaster believes people subsequently read and attached "various different numinous, archetypal, and religious meanings into the motif." His work complements and confirms Dr. Tom Greeves's "caution against too quickly assuming one knows the 'meaning' of the hares motif." [ see Stadlen, .pdf] If one studies, and tries one's hand, the design is simple enough and easily fashioned. Create an appropriate body of a rabbit or hare and then fashion an ear. For three rabbits, use a triangle as the center. For four rabbits, use a square. Centuries ago did an artist create the appealing motif? After it spread and was reproduced on a number of objects, then perhaps as Singmaster and Greeves suggest, meanings came to be attached to the motif much later and over time.

One of the earliest literary references to the motif appears in Browne Willis' A Survey of the Cathedral of St Davids, published in 1717. The description reads: "In one key stone near the west end are three rabbits plac'd triangularly, with the backsides of their heads turn'd inwards, and so contriv'd that the three ears supply the place of six so that every head seems to have its full quota of ears. This is constantly shewn to strangers as a curiosity worth regarding."

From China through Asia, Germany, France, England, and into Central Europe, the three rabbits and hares have run long distances and through centuries. They are still and remain "a curiosity" and a medieval mystery "worth regarding" even in the 21st century.

#### MESSENGER HARES and RABBITS: A Short Look

Our second exploration concerns the fascinating subject of messenger hares or rabbits. I first came across this topic when doing the original research for an article on the madness of March hares back in 2009 and for a sidebar to a revised version again in 2012. Malcolm Jones recounts the tale in his excellent and highly recommended volume titled The Secret Middle Ages. In a chapter on "Shoeing the Goose: the representation of proverbs and proverbial follies in art," Jones recounts the tale of "The Hare Messenger." The story concerns a group of peasants who are late with the rent. They catch a hare, because hares are, of course, fleet of foot. They attach the rent in a pouch around the hare's neck. The peasants instruct the hare to take the pouch directly to their landlord. Of course the hare runs off and is never seen again. The source of the tale is Odo of Cheriton's thirteenth century Latin collection of fables. Hares carry letters in many folk tales, and most of the tales comment upon the foolishness of those that would dispatch a hare in such circumstances.

As my longer article recounts, there is a possible association between these Messenger Hares and Lewis Carroll and his own messenger character, the White Rabbit. Both Jones and the volume The Lore of the Land by Westwood and Simpson include photos of a carving from the interior of Saint Mary's Church in Beverley, England. This very fine Yorkshire parish church was 'Founded c. 1120,' with 'a tower added in 1524.' The church was built over a course of centuries and it is within it, we find our fourteenth century eighteen-inch rabbit. Westwood and Simpson write: "There is a carving in the stone of an impost [which] is generally described as a rabbit walking upright, carrying a pilgrim's staff, and wearing a 'scrip' or satchel. Although the carving looks more like a cheerful rabbit than

anything else, it is undoubtedly a representation of the hare as messenger." (pp. 821-822)

One can judge for one's self as to if the carving more resembles a cute hare or a cute rabbit. See it here: http://commons.wikimedia.org/wiki/File:St.\_Mary%27s\_Church\_-\_The\_Pilgrim\_Rabbit.jpg It is reported the carving dates to 1325. (Please see my longer article for more details on how the young Charles Dodgson may have see this very carving in this church when he was visiting the area during childhood.)

In any case, whenever I look upon the Beverley carving, be it a messenger or pilgrim hare or rabbit or as the inspiration for Lewis Carroll's always in a hurry White Rabbit, I am reminded of those multitudes of standing Easter Rabbit chocolate molds and cellophane wrapped chocolate bunnies myself. If we subtletie makers ever need to document a rabbit standing upright for a subtletie, the Beverly Pilgrim is certainly an apt and appropriate source. Happy springtime everyone!

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Note: If you would like to create your own springerle, marzipan, or even candy rabbits for Easter or springtime, (either as messengers or as three rabbits running), Springerle Joy in Pittsburgh carries both molds in appropriate sizes.

# A Translation of Iranisches Namenbuch by Ferdinand Justi, Marburg, 1895

I have been translating a book of Persian names for the last couple of years (Iranisches Namenbuch by Ferdinand Justi, Marburg, 1895), and I have found a few names for horses. Some are historical. Most are from the Shahnameh (the Persian national epic translated into Arabic by Ferdowsi), and the last one is from the Avesta.

And just to be a stick-in-the-mud herald: no, you can't register a name for your horse, but if it fits your persona, go ahead and use it (for the horse, that is).

Behzad name of the horses of Siyawush, Kai Khusrau and Kai Gushtasp (Shahnameh)

Ferdad horses of Windad Hormizd (ao. 783AD) Gulgun Lohrasp (Shahnameh) i.e., rose-colored

(modern form for Old. Pers. Rodogune)

Pasakas Warhorse of Cyrus the Younger (423BC) i.e., wild horse

Rakhsh Rustam (Shahnameh) i.e., skewbald

Shibdaz Khusrau II (600AD)

Shabdez Bahram Gor (420AD), also called Shabrang Shabrang horse of Alkos, Bezhan and Isfendiar

(Shahnameh) i.e., night-colored (black)

Sholak Isfendiar (Shahnameh) - i.e., the runner Wareshnaspa stallion - name of one of the three holiest fires, which shine on the stallion of Kai Khusrau, as the latter destroyed the idol temple on the Urmia Sea

And horse-related names ('Av' indicates the name is from the Avesta, 'Sh' from the Shahnameh):



#### Most Suitable for a Summer: Fruit and Vegetable Subtleties & Carving Sources By 7HL Johnnae llyn Lewis. CE

Carved watermelons have been part of the Society's summer banquet tables for decades. I can personally remember creating a festive one for a Middle Kingdom head table as far back as the summer of 1974. The nagging question has always been: Was it appropriate (or period) to do so? Fruit carving has been a subject of much discussion on the various Society Cookery E-Lists over the past several years. On the one hand we know watermelons are of course suitable for eating as they were grown within our period in the lands surrounding the Mediterranean, but the question often arises as to whether or not medieval or Renaissance cooks ever carved or served decorated melons. Did they carve any fruits or vegetables for decorative purposes at all prior to 1650?

The one long quoted recipe with the evidence is this instructive recipe by Gervase Markham. It appears in his volume The English Housewife. There we have carrots of differing colors cut into various shapes for use in a sallat.

Sallats for shew onely.

Now for Sallets for shew only, and the adorning and setting out of a table with numbers of dishes, they be those which are made of Carret rootes of sundrye colours well boiled, and cut out into many shapes and proportions, as some into knots, some in the manner of Scutchions and Armes, some like Birds, and some like wild Beasts, according to the Art and cunning of the Workman; and these for the most part are seasoned with Vinegar, Oyle, and a little Pepper. A world of other Sallets there are, which time and experience may bring to our Hous wifes eye, but the composition of them, and the seruing of them differeth nothing from these already rehearsed. Pp 66-67.

use in sallats, but does help us in our quest? (Today's cooks seeking to follow Markham's instructions might make use of those small modern stainless steel hors d'oeuvres or garnishing cutters of assorted shapes and turn this activity into an easy task.)

Markham's Housewife dates from as early as 1615 and dominated the marketplace for almost thirty years.

Where else might one look for such instructions besides Markham? Well, there are works dedicated to just carving. In 1508 Wynkyn de Worde printed the first book dedicated to the art of carving in England. Titled The Boke of Keruynge, the early Tudor work was reprinted and included then in numerous other cookery

So here we are given license to "fancify up" carrots for

books until well past the English Civil War, into the Restoration period, and even into the 1680s by which time it was quite dated to say the least. De Worde's Boke is dedicated primarily to meats and famously instructs one how to "break and display" game and domestic animals, fish, and birds, and includes what sauces must be served with said meats for the noble table. The Boke of Keruynge does not, however, delve into the carving of fruits or vegetables nor does it feature illustrations for carving.

Roughly contemporary with Markham, however, is an Italian carving book, which does include both fruit carving and illustrations. Mattia Giegher's instructive Italian works featured elaborate folding of napkins, carving instructions, stewardship, and table service. They were first published in II Trinciante (Padoua) in 1621 and in 1623. Later in 1639 after Giegher's death, Li Tre Trattati (a combination of Giegher's earlier books and more importantly featuring 48 engraved plates) was published. Almost as an afterthought, this carving manual includes engravings, which feature "frutti". Food historian Ivan Day describes the book as showing how to "also whittle fruits, such as citrons, into the most extraordinary shapes." (Day, p. 123) [Collectors may like to know that Arnaldo Forni Editore has published a facsimile of the 1639 Li Tre Trattati, so it is possible to actually own a copy.]

It's possible today to actually browse through Giegher's masterpiece online. After a number of false starts and several hours, I finally managed to locate an online copy which includes the sought after plates. (Any number of these early volumes may exist but often they lack the desired woodcuts or engravings. The valuable culinary illustrations or fold-outs have simply disappeared over the subsequent centuries. Often the illustrations were also removed and framed.) The Academia Barilla Gastronomic Library has a copy. It may be viewed online once one has registered. Plate 21 (image/page 150) shows a pear being sliced into birds. Plate 22 (image/page 152) shows cedri or citrons being carved into flowers, fish, turtles, & birds and even forming the center of a double-headed eagle. The final page shows melarance or oranges being carved into a variety of decorative spheres. Academia Barilla allows zooming so one can examine all the details. It's a marvelous work, and we should be very grateful that this early seventeenth century work and the plates can be viewed online.

The Eastern Tradition

So in the west, we have 17th century sources for the practice, but if we are willing to look to the Far East, we can date fruit and vegetable carving back another four or five centuries or possibly even to the Chinese Tang Dynasty (AD 618-906) and Sung Dynasty (AD 960-1279). The new revised volume of Culinaria China in the section on "The sweet fruits of Fujian" states definitely "The art of fruit and vegetable carving in China dates back to the Tang dynasty (618-907)."

Interestingly, we also know that the watermelon was introduced and being grown in India in the 9th century and in China possibly as early as the 10th century. By the 11th century, (c 1080 AD) sources mention that the Chinese were eating watermelon seeds, a habit that continues to this day. Were they carving watermelons in the Far East as early as the 10th or 11th centuries? The September 2008 issue of Saveur magazine #113 carried a major article on watermelons. Included in that article on pages 78-79 is a paragraph devoted to the art of watermelon carving or garnishing. Of interest to us in the Society, is the section that talks about the history of fruit carving in Southeast Asia. It reads:

"In Thailand, however, the elaborate carving of watermelon and other fruits and vegetables is a long-standing and respected tradition that dates to the 14th century, when the art evolved in the court of King Phra Ruang. Chefs for Thai nobility and royalty were expected to make food that was not only delicious but also beautiful, even fantastical."

Other sources date festival fruit carving to an exact year, 1364 to be exact. There are literally dozens of sites now on the Internet, which cite the same date, the same king, and the same tradition. Are all these sites correct or are they merely copying each other? I'm still not certain, but I am hopeful that perhaps the forthcoming reference volumes The Oxford Companion to Chinese Food by Fuchsia Dunlop and The Oxford Companion to Southeast Asian Food by Sri Owen will contain details on the history of fruit carving and clear up some of the various mysteries.

Meanwhile, Julia Abramson's article for a previous Oxford Symposium points out that the Eastern tradition is alive and well. Try a Google Images search under "watermelon carving". Add in the term Thailand" or "China" and that will narrow the search. Or search YouTube and watch videos such as "A traditional Chinese dragon being carved around a watermelon." The Thai tradition is one of carving flowers, while the Chinese often incorporate more animals (like dragons) into their work.

Bookwise, Chef Martin Yan mentions food carving in his books, including his 2008 volume Martin Yan's China. (Yan now runs a culinary program in Shenzhen, China, which offers some tourist sessions.) Chef Fuchsia Dunlop in her award winning Shark's Fin and Sichuan Pepper

compares present day Chinese food sculpture to the creation of past subtleties. She writes, "It is as ostentatious and utter frivolous as the sugar-paste cathedrals... Vegetable carving can only exist in a society with a surplus of underpaid and underworked youths, who can be persuaded to spend hours engraving the outside of a watermelon with minutely realized scenes...."

Dunlop's words remind us that watermelon, fruit or vegetable carving can take a long time to master. Those extraordinarily intricate designs take practice and more time than one can often spare in those rushed hours before events. On the other hand, the activity is decorative, relatively inexpensive when the fruits or vegetables are in season and abundant, and a most festive thing to do for Society sideboards and tables. It's also fun and simple designs can be relatively easy, if one has the time. Professionals use special tools; one major drawback is the professional garnishing kits with the wide variety of tools and design cutters can be quite expensive and hard to come by. (Amazon.com at times offers a relatively priced imported Chinese "International Culinary Carving Set of 80 Pieces" for \$140. Other times the price soars upwards into hundreds more.) It's perhaps best to start simply with a selection of extra sharp and flexible paring knives. Throw in a few of those specialty shaped knives known as bird's beak paring knives before spending money on more elaborate garnishing knives and special saws. Or consider acquiring those pumpkin carving kits and making use of those tools; those always go on sale in late October or early November.

There are a number of other books which might help or provide inspiration, ideas, and patterns. Yuci Tan has written a general book titled The Art of Food Sculpture. Xiang Wang has authored a number of books which feature the Chinese techniques; Penpan Sittitrai and Sumitra Narain have written on the Thai techniques. The Decorative Art of Japanese Food Carving: Elegant Garnishes for All Occasions by Hiroshi Nagashima (2009) covers the Japanese techniques. Inquire if your local public library can interlibrary loan these books for you, as the books are not inexpensive.

I would end as I did many years ago and say once again that serving carved watermelons or other fruits and even vegetables, can still be as it was centuries ago 'marvelously refreshing' and entertainingly festive on today's Society tables.

- Store, transport, setup and teardown the range, including stands and target butts.

- Store and transport loaner weapons including knives, axes and spears.
- Act as the Marshall in charge at practices and run the line.
- Instruct beginners on the basics of throwing and range safety.
- Make sure all paperwork including Woodley Park and minors waivers are filled out properly.
- Inspect and ensure the quality of weapons and range equipment
- · Repair and replace any weapons or range equipment that need attention using baronial Thrown Weapon's budget.
- Enlist deputies and MiTs to assist at the range, at meetings and with paperwork.
- Send in quarterly reports to the Kingdom Earl marshal of thrown weapons on March 1st, June 1st, September 1st and December 1st. Check manual for what to include in these reports.

Likewise, if you want to learn a specific dance – ask and I'll do my very best to make that happen too.
